Sandbar Lounge LLC, 150 Warren Avenue, Hemal Patel, Manager

Mr. Martin Hemsley, 200 Warren Avenue said that he lives half a mile away from the Sandbar Lounge (formerly Pilgrim Sands Hotel). Mr. Hemsley said that he purchased his home in 2019, but in 2021, the Pilgrim Sands Hotel began playing music on their patio, with a band that had music amplifiers, directed towards his home. Mr. Hemsley said that the music was so loud, that he did not feel comfortable sitting outside near his home. Mr. Hemsley said that he complained to the former manager at the Pilgrim Sands Hotel and called the Police Department several times. Mr. Hemsley said that he called the former Hotel owners upwards of 15 times to complain about the noise.

Sunil Anshan, co-partner of the Sandbar Lounge LLC, the new operations manager was asked questions by Mr. Bletzer. Mr. Bletzer asked Mr. Anshan when the owners officially

took over the property. Mr. Anshan said they took ownership of the property on April 18, 2023. Mr. Anshan said that in Massachusetts, he co-owns eight hotels, including two in the Town of Plymouth. Mr. Bletzer asked Mr. Anshan if they had received noise complaints at their other hotels. Mr. Anshan said he has not received any complaints about noise at his other properties in the Town. Mr. Bletzer said that the owners of the Sandbar Lounge, listen to concerns from neighbors and move speakers to the direction of Long Beach, rather than the nearby homes. Mr. Anshan said that he would do everything he could to work with the neighbors and address their concerns regarding amplified music.

Mr. Hemsley noted that the volume level on the patio should be at a tolerable level. Mr. Sims, the Counsel representing Mr. Hemsley said that the priority should be to move the speakers away from the direction of nearby homes and to turn the volume down to a reasonable level. Mr. Anshan agreed. Mr. Bletzer said that if the issue is not resolved Mr. Hemsley come back before the Board at a future meeting.

On a motion by Charlie Bletzer and seconded by John Mahoney, the Board voted to approve the All Alcohol Innholder License, as presented.

## **PUBLIC COMMENTS**

Al DiNardo, Town Meeting member, Precinct 17, said that he and his neighbors are concerned with Redbrook and A.D. Makepeace regarding minor watering restrictions, could become more catastrophic if there was a drought. Mr. Quintal said that Mr. Hartmann, Planning Director, said the agreement was a private matter between Redbrook/A.D. Makepeace, and not with the Town of Plymouth.

#### FIRST THANKSGIVING REMAILING PROGRAM

George McKay was dressed up in a Turkey costume and described the annual remailing program. Mr. McKay said that in the first year of the program, in 2021, 21,000 cards were mailed regarding Plymouth as the site of the First Thanksgiving. Mr. McKay said that over 44,000 were mailed in 2022. Mr. McKay anticipates that over 50,000 cards will be mailed in 2023. Mr. McKay described the illustrations on the postcards that were designed by children in the Town.

# WATERFRONT DISTRICT ZONE HEIGHT RESTRICTION BYLAW PROPOSAL BY PRECINCT 3

Dale Webber, Precinct 3 Chair, described Precinct 3's proposal for a Fall Town Meeting warrant article to establish an amendment to the zoning bylaw. The current zoning bylaw allows for new building heights of 35 feet and below. Mr. Webber said that the proposed amendment would lower the maximum height of new buildings to 25 feet in the Waterfront District Zone. Mr. Webber asked the Board to support this initiative. Mr. Webber said that this proposal has been discussed for more than a year, however, with new recent development that is occurring outside of the Historic District, he believes there is an urgent need to amend the zoning bylaw.

Mr. Mahoney asked Mr. Webber if someone sold their property, does that mean the new owner would be restricted to the proposed 25-foot height restriction. Mr. Webber said that is a question for the Planning Board.

Mr. Helm asked Mr. Webber where the Precinct came up with the idea of a maximum height restriction of 25 feet, and if they consulted architects regarding this. Mr. Webber said that there was no scientific research done to create the proposed 25-foot zone. Mr. Helm recommends that the requestors consult with architects to determine what 25 feet mean for the structure of a building. Mr. Helm said that barring a special determination from a surveyor, due to FEMA restrictions, new structures must be built at or above 14 feet higher than sea level. Mr. Quintal said that he was concerned about the possibility of numerous flatroof buildings due to the proposed height restrictions.

## FALL TOWN MEETING WARRANT ARTICLE DISCUSSION

On a motion by John Mahoney and seconded by Harry Helm, the Board voted to approve sponsoring an article for the Fall Town Meeting to approve the newly written and negotiated PILOT Program with Holtec International.

## TOWN MANAGER'S REPORT

Mr. Brothers said that the CodeRED, emergency notification system, is through the Plymouth County Sheriff's Office, and residents would have to sign up for notifications on their cellphones. Mr. Brothers said all landlines are automatically enrolled in the CodeRED system.

Mr. Brothers said that the Town established an Elderly and/or Disabled Taxation Assistance Fund, and \$11,000 was collected so far. Mr. Brothers said that the Assessing Office and the Elderly and Disabled Tax Assistance Committee would like to present at a future meeting, the regulations to distribute the funds.

Mr. Brothers said that the Stephens Field project's lowest bid came in \$350,000 over the budgeted amount. Mr. Brothers said that the Town Manager's Office and the Finance Director are researching ways to absorb the costs, likely by allocating ARPA funds.

### **SELECT BOARD OPEN DISCUSSION**

Mr. Helm said that he received an email from a citizen requesting that Morton Park ticketing begin at 7:00 a.m. as opposed to 8:30 a.m. Mr. Helm said that before the ticketing begins, carloads of people arrive before 8:30 a.m. Mr. Helm said that he would request a presentation from Town staff regarding a recap of the Summer of 2023 at Morton Park.

Mr. Bletzer sends his condolences to Fire Fighter Dale Melanson, who recently passed away from complications from ALS disease.
